Thursday April 28<sup>th</sup>. Number present rather less than usual. School commenced as usual. Lessons according to ordinary routine.

In the afternoon, a holiday, the Master being absent at "Battalion Day" at Hitchin.

Monday: May 2<sup>nd</sup> School as usual. The attendance still lower than ordinary, the militia being in the town.

Thursday, May 5<sup>th</sup>. School commenced at 9:30 precisely. The Rev<sup>d</sup> T.

Woodward, Diocesan Inspector, visited the school for Examination. All Classes were examined in Reading, Writing, Arithmetic and Religious Knowledge. The 1<sup>st</sup> Class was examined likewise in Composition & the 1<sup>st</sup> 2<sup>nd</sup>, &3<sup>rd</sup> in Dictation. - this latter subject requires especial attention. M<sup>r</sup>. R. Cooke visited the School in the morning, the Rev<sup>d</sup> J.W. Birch in the afternoon. School closed in the morning at 12:15, afternoon at 4. The attendance was not up to the ordinary average, for reasons already referred to above.

Austin, McLean & Bunyon very badly behaved. Reported to M<sup>r</sup> Ludlow.

25<sup>th</sup> Spoke to boys about behaviour out of school, & punctuality.

26<sup>th</sup> Attendance smaller than usual on account of the heavy fall of snow. 96 100

27<sup>th</sup> Snowing all day with slight thaw. 90 a.m. 77 p.m.

30<sup>th</sup> Snow & thaw, small school.

31<sup>st</sup> Attendance better. House boys troublesome.

Feb 6<sup>th</sup> Several old scholars returned. 125 present in the morning.

Formed an upper division in first class for higher XXX of sixth measure.

14<sup>th</sup> Commenced dictation on paper to first class. Two candidates for Pupil Teachership.

15<sup>th</sup> Heard of M<sup>r</sup> Silverside's appointment as clerk, & consequent resignation of the assistant mastership.

20<sup>th</sup> M<sup>r</sup> Green commenced his duties as assistant master this morning. Feb 24<sup>th</sup> Raining, smaller attendance. Rob<sup>t</sup> Cocks finished, left for Christ Church School, Ware.

27<sup>th</sup> 114 present. Two monitors (U. Miller & J Deards) in place of R. Cocks & a monitor from first class. Two divisions - monitor for each. Miller & Deards to stay till the Inspector visit as paid monitors, if fit & required to be Pupil Teachers.

March 7<sup>th</sup> Found that the House boys had the 'ringworm'. Desired the Master to keep them at home till well.

14<sup>th</sup> M<sup>r</sup> Birch came, said that the alteration of the Church Day to Friday should commence next week as he forgot to mention it to M<sup>r</sup> Burnel before. Spoke to M<sup>r</sup> Birch & M<sup>r</sup> Ludlow about the probability of a government inspection this year, asked whether the requirement of the committee of Council that all the school buildings should be devoted to the use of this school, would be met. The matter to be referred to M<sup>r</sup> Cowper & the Teachers of the Green Coat School.

20<sup>th</sup> M<sup>r</sup> JW Birch visited in the morning & said that the Council had sent to M<sup>r</sup> Robinson H.M. Inspector that the attendance was <u>not</u> to be counted when the children went to church. Several panes of glass out of classroom windows - strong East wind. Reed Farm at Brickendon caught fire. Many children absent in consequence.

21<sup>st</sup> Glass put in classroom window.

28<sup>th</sup> Heard from M<sup>r</sup> Ludlow that the school garden was proposed as a site for the Green School.

31<sup>st</sup> M<sup>r</sup> Ludlow called about the feasibility of building a new school for the Green boys in the garden of the Cowper School.

April 6<sup>th</sup> Very unwell, cold & headache. Miss Stoddard brought missionary papers for distribution among the boys.

27<sup>th</sup> Several boys went to hear a lecture in the Green School at 4.15, by an escaped slave.

May 2<sup>nd</sup> Re-admitted W White. M<sup>r</sup> S Austin<sup>18</sup> visited the school, examined some of the 'House Boys' & expressed his satisfaction at their attainments. 5<sup>th</sup> Rev J Birch came & arranged that the children should go to Church at 9.30 on Sundays whilst the Militia are in the Town.

9<sup>th</sup> Three House boys, McLean, Sharpe & Shepherd absent, having run away from the Workhouse. Reason given by the other boys, 'McLean had been

punished by the Master of the House.' Bunyan was late, he being with them, refused to run away.

12<sup>th</sup> Morning 85 present. Exam class I & II in Arith. & Scrip. Class I Good, II Fair. Class III writing from memory. Annual fair held today, few present in afternoon. Dismissed at 3.15, no registers.

24<sup>th</sup> Several boys went to see a microscope in the Green School.

25<sup>th</sup> Ascension Day. Registers marked at 9.45 as usual. At 10.45 found we were expected to attend Church. School attendance therefore not to be counted for this morning. Holiday in the afternoon on account of the Militia Service at Hartham.

May 26<sup>th</sup> M<sup>r</sup>Ludlow brought the visitor's report (M<sup>r</sup> S Austin), spoke of the satisfactory state of the House Boys &c. & the desirability of removing W Baynes from the school on account of his being an idiot.

June 1<sup>st</sup> Dismissed at 4.15 for the usual Whitsun Holiday.

7<sup>th</sup> Commenced with 50 boys. Many gone to Hatfield Races.

14<sup>th</sup> Rev J Birch came & told the boys that he would not allow boys to go to the treat who did not attend Sunday School unless their parents were dissenters.

28<sup>th</sup> Dissenters Sunday School Treat, several boys absent in consequence.
July 5<sup>th</sup> Several boys absent in the afternoon at the Cherry fair & the Cricket Match at Balls Park. E. Hewill gone to the Baptist Sunday School Treat.
18 Nomination of candidates for the Knights of the Shire of Hertford.

21 M<sup>r</sup> G Green absent went to attend his sister's funeral.

24 G Green resigned. Declaration of the poll - half holiday.

July 26 School examined in standards by Her Majesty's Inspector Rev C Robinson.

27 School inspected in the morning by the Rev C Robinson. No assistant master present.

31 Readmitted Arthur Dickens from the British School., Class II. All the classes worked in the Schoolroom under the Master & Monitor.

Aug 7<sup>th</sup> M<sup>r</sup> Cousins complained of being interrupted by House Boys as they are going to & from school. Found on inquiry that the offenders were House Boys who did not go to school.

Hertford Cowper Testimonial School Summary of the Inspector's Report on the School. 2<sup>nd</sup> August 1865 "The attainments are very fair. The School is too noisy, but I hope it will improve in that respect, as in the discipline generally.

The Master needs more assistance.

Nov 6 Attendance small in the morning. Holiday in the afternoon to celebrate Fawkes Day.

Nov 21 Thomas Porter appointed assistant master: duties to commence after the Christmas holidays.

22 Rev Woodward, Diocesan Inspector examined the boys. Wet day. 77 present on that account, &c no notice had been sent to the School. After examination, M<sup>r</sup> Woodward addressed the boys: he impressed upon them 'learn yourselves', and spoke of the Scripture answering being the best of their answers, & hoped they would practise as well as learn.

Jan 15 Thomas Porter commenced duties - kept very fair order in his classes (III & IV).

16 Window broken by W<sup>m</sup> Smith firing a cannon.

Jan 29 Homework, chiefly Arithmetic to all in First Two Classes.

30<sup>th</sup> Homework done well by both classes.

Feb 5 Commenced the week with 84 boys. Winkworth readmitted. F Butler dead (fever).

Mar 14 Fast day on account of the Cattle Plague. Church in the morning. 1<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> hours school in the afternoon. No Registers.

Mar 21 All but a few boys went to Circus in the afternoon.

April 11 A few boys absent, & others late through going to see the wild beast show.

(Now after(noon) 2.15 - school closing at 4:15 during the Summer months) April 17 Altered the timetable so that Classes 2 and 5 received more of the master's attention in reading and Class 2 in Arithmetic. Aug 1 Rev C Robinson examined the boys in their classes and Standards.

79 boys present. School dismissed for the day, classes 3 - 6 at 12.10 & 1 & 2 at 12.45.

Aug 3 House boys absent: gone to Woodhall Park.

8 Rev C Robinson visited the School in the morning, heard the scripture lessons; questioned classes 1 & 2 in Geography.

9 Dismissed at 11.45 to reassemble at 2.15 to march to Bailey Hall field for annual school gathering.

10 Dismissed the boys at 11.45 for the Harvest Holidays, assemble again on Tuesday, Sep 10.

Sep 10 Assembled at 9.30. Attendance 64, a few boys still away harvesting, several absent on account of wet weather.

Sep 27 Master left at 11.35 to go to Cheltenham to attend a reunion of students at the Normal College. School left in charge of the Assistant and Pupil Teacher.

Oct 1 School commenced at 9.30 as normal. Commenced new quarter in Registers. Numbers on books 21, 20, 17, 19, 16, 14 in each class

respectively. M<sup>r</sup> Law came in the afternoon & told the boys he intended to be present at the Sunday School & to teach, & asked them to attend. Parents had been visited & it was found that mainly attended the Wesleyan, & others the Baptist, & others the Independent Sunday School.

Oct 5 Sent the assistant's resignation to M<sup>r</sup> Ludlow.

Oct 21 Dark & foggy afternoon. Arthur Carter and Joseph Styles appointed monitors with a view to them becoming Pupil Teachers after H.M. Inspector's visit.

9 Received complaint from M<sup>rs</sup> Styles of Miller, his conduct out of school being calculated to influence for evil, referred it to the vicar.

Jan 10 Miller's conduct to be referred to the Committee.

Feb 4 Master absent three weeks scarlet fever in the family & master unwell the first week. School carried on, in conjunction with the Green Coat School, in this building by M<sup>r</sup> Grove with Pupil Teacher and 2 monitors form this school & a monitor from the Green Coat School. Pupil Teacher received lessons at M<sup>r</sup> Grove's evening school.

Commenced with 71 boys this morning. Savage & Saville have gone of Berkhampstead School, & Hart to Bull Plain.

6 Smallpox at the workhouse, boys absent. Wet day, attendance small, singing hymns instead of scripture lesson. F. Hutchings admitted from Cowbridge.

28 Harding's club money cancelled, given to  $M^r$  Grove to be entered on his club.  $M^r$  Warleigh called to enquire for a Schoolmaster salary £30 & house for day school & perhaps £20 might be made by night school. Have not met with a master wishing such a school.

Mar 6 Ash Wednesday. Church at 10:40. No registers. Holiday in the afternoon.

7 Snowy day - many absent.

12 M<sup>r</sup> Ludlow called after 4 o'clock to enquire about Miller's conduct during the past month. His work at home has been better, & his conduct at School has been rather better but not satisfactory.

14 A heavy fall of snow kept several boys away today. Attendance small.

18 Found that M<sup>rs</sup> Allen's son has scarlet fever. Had the door of the room joining the classroom undone, & boys enter by the upper front door. April 12 M<sup>r</sup> Allen's son died this morning in rooms under the school, from scarlet fever.

15 Closets & rooms below fumigated, to be white or lime washed, carbolic acid and chloride of lime used for the drawers, &c.

16 Charles Overall admitted, to attend while his father is on duty in the town as Sergeant of Militia. E. Allen buried today.

May 23 School for 2 hours in the morning, small attendance. No registers. Holiday in the afternoon. Review & athletic sports of the Militia.

May 29 James Walton died yesterday of scarlet fever.

June 12 Assembled at 9.30 took club money: dismissed for the remainder of the week to allow master to see the Secretaries of the Church Missionary Society about an appointment in Bombay.

Sep 30 Commenced new quarter in Registers, divided the school into five classes: Class 5 corresponding to standard I at the next examination, Class 4, Standard II, Class 3 Standard III, Class 2 Standard IV, Class 1 all above standard VI, upper division st VI & VII, lower division st V.

#### Report 1867

"The boys are making satisfactory progress."

"The number of those presented for examination - 34 is exceedingly small compared with the number qualified for examination - 62. It is obvious that when so few children of those qualified are submitted to it, the examination is no satisfactory test of the general instruction of the school.

4 House boys absent.

5 Found on enquiry that the house boys were staying away because Dr Woodhouse thought there was a danger of their catching small-pox which is prevalent in the Hertford. Stokes ill with scarlet fever.

11 Sent W Teichener home, brother & father ill with small-pox. Find that many families in the lower part of the town have it.

16 H Barnard died of small-pox, absent from school a week previously.

18 M<sup>r</sup> Birch visited. Engaged to take the Second City School, Shoe Lane, Fleet Street after the Xmas holidays.

20 Gave out club tickets, for interest given see Club book. Arranged school for holidays, books &c. Bade the boys 'good bye' & dismissed them for their Xmas holidays, to reassemble Jan 13.

(3 weeks instead of 2, to allow more time to settle with a master.) Made out bill for house boys, 9 boys @ 5s per qu £2.10 sent to M<sup>r</sup> Wheeler. Pupil Teacher Charles Augustus Miller (in 3<sup>rd</sup> year) Alfred Wilson (in 1<sup>st</sup> year). Monitor Joseph Styles (6d per week)

## 1868

Jany 13 Commenced school after the Xmas holidays. M<sup>r</sup> Grove<sup>16</sup> carried on the Green Coat School & this school today in this schoolroom because the

master was unable to get to Hertford today.

15 I, Charles A. Blackwell, late of Byfleet N. School and previously of St Mary's Haggerston NE commenced duty at this school for the first time - 25 present in the morning, 30 in the afternoon, smallpox being very prevalent deters many from coming.

20<sup>th</sup> Monday Improvement in attendance. Too much noise as yet, in changing lessons, owing to the loud tone the pupil teachers give their orders.

23 1st & 2<sup>nd</sup> classes wrote Precis on Scripture instead of usual Oral lesson as I have a fearful cold caused by removing into a damp house in wet weather.

30 The bigger boys in this school invariably try how much a new master will put up with - Jolliffe, Hollingdale, Bolton disobedient after leaving school last night. Tried mild measures first, found them failing, on Jolliffe's repeated disobediences, thrashed him this morning: all the bigger boys were astounded, and discipline was considerably improved.

Feb 4 Beautiful weather this afternoon, so to keep up a good custom, we are going out for a walk this day with the scholars.

20 M. Frankies, a foreigner, recoloured Y B Boards for the school. Chalk marks may now easily be seen; but not effaced very well, without washing.

27 Judge entered the town in the afternoon. Jeremy and Dymock being in the Volunteer Band excused attendance at School. M<sup>r</sup> Stiles made a complaint against Miller; investigated it, found it almost groundless, and prompted by bad feeling.

March 4 Abused by M<sup>rs</sup> Gear. Gave her boy and others one slight tap with the cane yesterday not knowing Fred<sup>k</sup> Gear was XXXX and had puffy flesh. Explained the matter to M<sup>rs</sup> Gear. Mem, not to punish Gear on the hand but on the shoulder.

9 M<sup>r</sup> Austin came in the afternoon for a boy who would do for a Reader at his printing office, recommended J. Jeremy.

17 Sanger's circus came into the town, Kiff and Taylor away from school in the morning, and Gutteridge came in at 11.30.

25 Lady-day. Thirteen pauper boys have not attended at all during the past quarter, by the doctor's order. The town is now quite free of smallpox.

26 Sent a note to M<sup>r</sup> Wheeler, governor of the Union, inviting him to send the boys, as a new Quarter has commenced.

30 Nine work-house boys attended for the  $1^{st}$  time this year.

April 1<sup>st</sup> Last night after school the Hertford boys and those from Hertford

heath quarrelled. It originated between individual boys on each side, one Saturday a few weeks ago. Investigated the affair this morning. Showed the silliness, danger, and unchristian of doing so. Eight Heath boys slunk away home in the morning just before school.

3 Gave Hollingdale an imposition, degraded him for a week to the third class, made further punishment contingent upon his behaviour.

7 Hollingdale very well behaved, encouraged him. Degradation better than flogging him.

28 Received a proof from M<sup>r</sup> Simpson the printer of the absentee tickets ordered of him on Friday night. Price 7/6 per thousand.

May 4 Arthur Dickens applied for re-admission. Sent to the treasurer and secretary for their advice, as Dickens had only just completed a term of imprisonment for stealing from the till and had moreover been dismissed from school two years previously for ill behaviour. He is to come as long as his behaviour is satisfactory.

12 Hertford fair. Attendance good in the morning. In the afternoon, some of the smallest boys kept at home from fear of accident in passing through the horse fair to the school.

13 The two Bouchiers left. Their father having returned from New Zealand, and taken his sons from the Union last night.

June 16<sup>th</sup> House boys absent this afternoon, with leave, that they will see the wax-work exhibition in the town.

18<sup>th</sup> The Herts Yeomanry Cavalry assembled at Hertford to day. Meagre attendance at school.

22nd The committee assembled at the Abel Smith School formally appointed me, master of this school.

24<sup>th</sup> Midsummer Day, sent in quarter's bill for myself and pupil teachers, paid same day.

July 2<sup>nd</sup> Cottagers' Flower show. Some of the boys absent on that account.

6<sup>th</sup> 75 Present in the morning. Cherry fair in the Afternoon. So many boys late that I did not mark the registers.

8<sup>th</sup> Returned Charles Gear's two shillings, that he had deposited in the clothing Fund. E. Hewitt and W and H Cooper had permission to be away at the Cowbridge Sunday School tea party.

10<sup>th</sup> Examination in the morning. No school in the afternoon, being the Annual meeting of the Herts Education Union.

July 13<sup>th</sup> No school in the afternoon as the boys attended the Annual Missionary Meeting for Juveniles, held at Abel Smith School at 3 PM this

day.

14<sup>th</sup> Dymock and Jeremy had leave of absence to attend the archery meeting at Wood-hill as band-boys.

15<sup>th</sup> Baptist Sunday School Tea party. About 15 of our boys absent on that account. Drilled the boys in the morning.

July 24<sup>th</sup> Attendance very thin, and all the week, owing to the excessive heat, sickness, and the harvest. Received a note from M<sup>rs</sup> Wilmot, requesting the payment of G. Hollingworth's club money: upon consideration declined to do so until the card is given up and I no longer liable for the money.

27<sup>th</sup> Attendance decreased, 55 and 53. Excursion to Hunstanton; some boys visiting, many ill and a few gleaning. 22 absent of those intended for examination.

28h Attendance improved. 62 in the morning. Excursion to Ramsgate. Sent notes requesting the attendance of certain boys at the Examination.

29<sup>th</sup> None of the Hertford Heath boys have yet attended this week. Heard that they had informed their parents that the holidays had already commenced. Examined the boys in the course of scripture they have had since Christmas.

30<sup>th</sup> H.M.I. The Rev<sup>d</sup> C.I. Robinson inspected the school.

 1868 Charles H. Blackwell, Master. Chas Miller, Pupil teacher of 3<sup>rd</sup> year Alfred Wilson, "1<sup>st</sup> year C.J. Robinson H.M. Inspector

August 31<sup>st</sup> Resumed school after a month's holiday. 75 present. W. Chaplin knocked down by a runaway horse and dangerously hurt, not expected to recover.

September 4<sup>th</sup> All with the exception of the 6<sup>th</sup> class had paper supplied them, for the weekly examination.

September 7<sup>th</sup> Chaplin after a serious relapse on Saturday, is again progressing favourably. 75 present in the morning. Powell's Circus exhibited in the town. Small attendance and no registers in the afternoon. Fitzjohn and Epgrave said to have run away from the Union because M<sup>r</sup> Wheeler had limited their food, for loitering about the circus. "8<sup>th</sup> Fitzjohn and Ephgrave returned. Punished them for playing truant yesterday afternoon.

" 11<sup>th</sup> Examination on paper, for the whole school. The boys are taking more pains with their writing. Bygrave and Rob<sup>t</sup> Aylott rewarded for neatness..

"18<sup>th</sup> Attendance small in the afternoon owing to a heavy storm just before assembly time

" 21<sup>st</sup> William Chaplin returned to school after 3 weeks illness.

" 24<sup>th</sup> Attendance at school good, some few absent at the Flower Show and ploughing match.

## Report 1868

"There is fair efficiency in the Discipline and Elementary attainments. With the present teaching staff the School ought to reach a higher rank. The number of children presented for examination is again very small compared with the number qualified by attendance. My Lords will be obliged to reduce the Grant under Article  $52(a)^{20}$  unless improvement in this respect is shown next year.

" 27<sup>th</sup> Called at Jolliffes yesterday, they have scarlatina in the family, advised the Jolliffes to keep Joshua from school till the family recovered.

"  $30^{\text{th}}$  Actual weekly average exclusive of late boys = 80. The best week's attendance for at least a twelve month. Sent after absentees. November  $3^{\text{rd}}$  The five Catlins away gathering litter for pigs. 9<sup>th</sup> Hertford Fair and Election of Mayor. Good attendance in the morning ; bad attendance in the afternoon, kept school; but did not mark registers.

" 11<sup>th</sup> Thin attendance in the afternoon. Boys are beginning to to ask to go home before dismission time.

" 16<sup>th</sup> Nomination Day of candidates for the representation of the Borough and County. 39 boys present in the morning and ten in the afternoon.

" 17<sup>th</sup> Polling day for the borough. Many boys absent from school., being employed as messengers by different candidates.

Nov. 18<sup>th</sup> Declaration of the Borough Poll. Fair attendance considering the General Election.

" 19<sup>th</sup> Polling for the County members. 1st class boys wrote a composition exercise on "the events of the week" and did it remarkably well.

"23<sup>rd</sup> Joseph Stiles late monitor, obtained a situation at M<sup>r</sup> Neales, Walter Dymock made monitor in his place.

December 7 The gale on Saturday evening has almost blown out one of the casements in the disused school. Sent to the plumber's to see to its repair.

" 8 matched 6 of our best spellers with 6 Green boys. The Cowper boys averaged 14 months younger than their opponents, and averaged 6 mistakes less in the dictation exercise.

December 9<sup>th</sup> M<sup>r</sup> Williams called and chose some some boys to assist in the Sunday evening choir.

16 81 present in the morning. House boys kept at home in the afternoon for examination by the chaplain. A very sudden violent gust of wind at 3.45 blew out a window in the disused school.

17 M<sup>r</sup> Hancock visitor in the morning. I pointed out to him the number of cracked windows & he said it was the effect of small shot, and not hail as I supposed. Attendance good, 3<sup>rd</sup> class retrograde in reading, punished the most careless, then made them take it word for word.

23<sup>rd</sup> Master and apprentices paid their salaries. Club money paid up; a statement of accounts given to M<sup>r</sup> Ludlow.

<sup>24<sup>th</sup></sup> Forty present. Kept school 2 hours, then dismissed for a fortnight. Senior PT. inspected the roof, as, directly after last holiday a quantity of lead was stolen. The premises are now in their usual state, i.e. in pretty good repair.

## 1869

January 18<sup>th</sup> Monday. Attendances 90, 90, maximum number for past two years.

19<sup>th</sup> M<sup>r</sup> Frances, nurseryman, buried. He having been a teacher in the Congregational Sunday school many of our boys attending that Sunday school, absent from school in the afternoon.

25<sup>th</sup> Windows repaired.

27 Catechism 8<sup>th</sup> and 9<sup>th</sup> commandment. 3<sup>rd</sup> class finished the SPCK reading book, No. 2 and commenced reading the geography of England and Wales. I endeavoured to make the reading as varied and interesting as possible.

Feb. 1<sup>st</sup> Some of the Hertford Heath boys absent, employed as beaters of the bushes.

18<sup>th</sup> Wombwell's menagerie in the town. Few boys absent, sent after the absentees as I feared some may have played truant.

22<sup>nd</sup> Henry Fitzjohn admitted, and Arthur Dickens left. The latter boy has been very attentive and well behaved since his readmission, see "Entry May 4<sup>th</sup> 1868."

24<sup>th</sup> Promoted Hervey, Farrow, Mansfield to the 3<sup>rd</sup> class, and Kidby, J Catlin, Fox, Walker and Warner to the 4<sup>th</sup>.

March 16<sup>th</sup> Found my desk broken open, the first thing this morning. Meeting of the school committee at the Abel Smith School.

March 18<sup>th</sup> M<sup>rs</sup> Allen gave up possession of the apartment below the school.

April 8<sup>th</sup> M<sup>rs</sup> Kiff called respecting her boy going to the Hertford Heath School.

"9<sup>th</sup> Eight Hertford Heath Boys left. The Rev M<sup>r</sup> Bevan of Hertford Heath having engaged a Master instead of a schoolmistress. Gave out cards showing attendance, conduct etc. for the first time.

April 14<sup>th</sup> S. Ginnett's circus in the town; a good attendance in the morning, very few in the afternoon; but marked no registers.

" 19<sup>th</sup> Green coat boys taught in this school to day, as their master has been appointed to a London school, and his successor cannot take charge of the Green coat school as yet. 124 present in the morning, i.e. 90 Cowper boys and 34 Green coats. Page, a Green coat boy disobedient and insolent to Miller the senior apprentice and attempted to kick him: Miller slapped his face.

" 20<sup>th</sup> M<sup>rs</sup> Page complained of Miller. I explained to her the true state

of the case, and said that the pupil-teachers were not allowed to chastise the boys under ordinary circumstances; but in this case he was justified in doing so in his own defence.

" 26<sup>th</sup> The two pupil-teachers confirmed this day at All Saints' church; consequently no school.

May 11<sup>th</sup> Detained Farrow in school as I find solitary detention to be more effective than corporal punishment.

" 12<sup>th</sup> Hertford May fair. Good attendance in the morning. No register in the afternoon, as many boys were late.

" 24<sup>th</sup> Jeremy, Standard VII joined the Militia Band. His mother asked my advice in the morning, counselled her to let him do so. M<sup>r</sup> Jeremy's late sudden death, putting a trade for the son out of the question.

" 25<sup>th</sup> R Aylott although the best at arithmetic, is very backward in orthography; his dullness proceeds from weakness, through poor diet (workhouse fare); gave him some food and his dizziness decreased.

"  $28^{th}$  Jeremy called to take leave, stayed tea with me, and I gave him some friendly advice. He has been one of the best and cleverest lads in the school. Wet in the afternoon, attendance smaller, no  $6^{th}$  class boy present. June  $2^{nd}$  Degraded Charles Edwards to the  $3^{rd}$  class on account of his indifference to progress.

" 4<sup>th</sup> Corner stone of the new St Andrew's church laid by Earl Cowper this afternoon; several boys absent on that account, allowed those present <sup>1</sup>/<sub>4</sub> hour's play.

" 14<sup>th</sup> Two boys admitted from the British School and one from the Ragged School<sup>21</sup>.

" 16<sup>th</sup> M<sup>rs</sup> Farrow called about her son's admission to the Green Coat School. Five other Cowper School boys are trying for admission also, asked the reason and was informed the gratuitous clothing was the chief inducement to obtain a presentation.

June 18<sup>th</sup> Edward Marshall obtained a presentation to the Green Coat School. M<sup>rs</sup> Walls is perfectly well satisfied with her son's progress here; but wishes to get him in the Green school for the benefit of the clothes. At least 4 others of these boys wish to obtain admission for the same reason. June 24<sup>th</sup> Master present at the examination at the Green coat school in the morning. 95 present here, pupil teachers conducted the school. House

boys kept at home in the afternoon for examination by the chaplain.

June 25<sup>th</sup> 1<sup>st</sup> class wrote abstracts on "The Irishman and the hare", "The English Drummer boy", and "Mary the maid of the inn", all tales from their

reading books. Pupil teachers received their quarter's salary. Miller applied for his indentures for the Inspector's perusal to-morrow. M<sup>r</sup> Ludlow said they were not in his possession and suggested they might be with M<sup>r</sup> Lingley.

June 28<sup>th</sup> Pupil teachers examined on Saturday, 26<sup>th</sup> inst. Bouchier a houseboy gone to sea. 101 present in the morning, which is the maximum attendance for several years. 88 in the afternoon. Received account of the society of arts examination March 16<sup>th</sup>, 4 out of 6 Cowper boys gained certificates.

June 30<sup>th</sup> End of school year. 120 on the books, 80 admitted during past year, 61 left. The boys who left were nearly all in Standards III, IV, V, VI and VII and those admitted were very backward.

July 1stStandards IV, V, VII read Macauley's "Spanish Armada", triedto infuse some spirit into the reading, explained the poem. VI and VII thenwrote an abstract, a paraphrase on it and IV and V transcribed a portion.July 19thMr Starr died on Friday night consequently Henry will leave at

once for work and W<sup>m</sup> will be excused this week.

21<sup>st</sup> Juvenile Athletic Club sports. Good attendance.

23<sup>rd</sup> Flogged Oddle for lying and stealing, he took a toy from a little boy. Oddle has been several times known to have stolen the boy's food.

" 29<sup>th</sup> M<sup>r</sup> Ludlow visitor. Ordered the school to be whitwashed, the gravel in the playground to be levelled and the safety of the swing post to be seen to, during the holidays.

July 30<sup>th</sup> 119 boys present at the examination, 57 presented. Half-holiday in the afternoon.

August  $2^{nd}$  114 present. Promoted all the boys who were examined last Friday,  $1^{st}$ ,  $3^{rd}$ ,  $4^{th}$  and  $5^{th}$  classes full, 2 and  $6^{th}$  rather thin. Walls obtained a presentation to the Green Coat School.

August 6<sup>th</sup> Had school in the morning and the school treat in Balls Park in the afternoon. Gave notice of a month's holiday, to assemble on Monday,

#### September 6<sup>th</sup>.

September 6<sup>th</sup> Resumed school 86 present in the morning, weather wet, four admissions, several boys left for work.

October 4<sup>th</sup> Paid PTs their quarter's salary.

" 3<sup>rd</sup> Received two tons of coal of M<sup>c</sup>Mullen & two boxes of pens from Simsons.

" 18<sup>th</sup> Reynolds admitted, detained the boys who were bad in church yesterday. Fox very bad, his mother sent a disrespectful note bringing a false charge against Miller, sent the boy back for his mother.

" 19<sup>th</sup> Weather very cold and windy, upper ventilators kept incessantly chattering, spoiling the discipline for the day.

" 21<sup>st</sup> M<sup>r</sup> Pigeon called about his son who had been playing truant all the week, he said the boy's mother was to blame. Promised to let the pence run on till M<sup>r</sup> Pigeon could bring it himself.

" 25<sup>th</sup> Monday. John Wackett returned from work, James from Cowbridge School. W Bouchier returned from sea. C. Fox's mother apologised and wished her son to be readmitted. 100 present.

Mess<sup>1</sup><sup>s</sup> Powell, Footit and Clarke's circus in the town, no registers in the afternoon owing to the scanty attendance.

"  $27^{\text{th}}$  Returned to M<sup>rs</sup> Bygrave the sum of £1"1"7 deposited by her sons Robert and William in the school clothing club.

Nov. 1<sup>st</sup> M<sup>r</sup> Bygrave called and objected to William and Robert's club money having been returned to his wife. An itinerant potter exhibited the process of shaping ware.

"  $2^{nd}$   $1^{st}$  and  $2^{nd}$  wrote composition on the potter's exhibition, and also on the Municipal Election.

Nov 3<sup>rd</sup> Received a cauldron of coke for use of school. 20 houseboys present. Received a gross of penholders from Simpson on Monday.

Nov 5<sup>th</sup> Walter Taylor injured in a fall in coming to school. Sent him home in charge of W. Smith. There being few boys present in the morning no registers were marked. Gave a short discourse on the Gunpowder Plot and the landing of the Prince of Orange. No school in the afternoon as is the custom.

" 8<sup>th</sup> Ketteridge returned after 18 months' absence. Farrow the most intelligent boy in the 3<sup>rd</sup> class gone into the Greencoat school. November Horse and cattle Fair, small attendance in the afternoon.

"16<sup>th</sup> Walls gone to Ragged school.

"22<sup>nd</sup> Dickens returned. Taken into custody by police for an alleged case of petty fraud.

" 23<sup>rd</sup> Dickens returned, the affair having been satisfactorily explained.

Dec 9<sup>th</sup> Houseboys late in the afternoon. Meat day, dinner late.

## 1870

 $Jan^{\nu} 24^{th}$  Missionary meeting held at Abel Smith School in the afternoon. 104 Cowper boys present.

" 25<sup>th</sup> 1<sup>st</sup> and 2<sup>nd</sup> classes wrote an account of the missionary meeting - result very fair.

Feb<sup>v</sup> 7<sup>th</sup> Received a note from M<sup>r</sup> Bouchiere concerning his son Robert's progress, same time M<sup>r</sup> Titmarsh sent a message complaining of his son's slow progress. Bouchier is regular, intelligent and painstaking; Titmarsh irregular, dull, and an arrant truant.

 $\operatorname{Feb}^{\underline{v}} 9^{\operatorname{th}}$  First two classes having finished St John's gospel, commenced it a second time.

14<sup>th</sup> Henry Armstrong at school last Friday, died next day of a

convulsive fit, 1<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> hour's illness. Called this day and sympathised with his parents. Received a note from M<sup>rs</sup> Harvey expressing her satisfaction at her sons' progress, stating same time that she had sent them to a private school, opened this morning a few yards from her house which is a considerable distance from this school. Called on her and returned the clothing club money.

Feb<sup> $\Sigma$ </sup> 17<sup>th</sup> H. Armstrong buried. Spoke to the boys about the uncertainty of life, of Armstrong's innocent life, and followed him to the grave.

" 24<sup>th</sup> Punished Oddel for chalking obscene words on the neighbours' palings and caused him to efface it.

" 25<sup>th</sup> Sent account to M<sup>r</sup> Ludlow of the school accommodation, average attendance, number of teachers and school hours of this school, the Abel Smith Sch; Infant-school; School of Industry and Green Coat School.

" 28<sup>th</sup> Received a ton of coal from M<sup>r</sup> McMullen. Claydon returned from work.

March 1<sup>st</sup> Punished Phipps, Bolton and Hewitt for playing hockey instead of coming to school.

March 3<sup>rd</sup> Discovered a small landslip in the school garden, 5 feet deep and six in diameter. Dispensed with school fires yesterday and to day owing to the mildness of the weather.

" 8<sup>th</sup> M<sup>r</sup> Wheeler sent word that the houseboys would not be at school this week owing to the prevalence of fever in the town. G. Ludlow, Esq. and Sergeant Wray cautioned the boys about playing at hockey or tip cat in the public roads.

"9<sup>th</sup> David Catlin obtained a presentation to the Green coat school. M<sup>rs</sup> Catlin expressed her satisfaction at her son's progress, and thanked me for the same, but having a large family she was glad to have her son clothed and educated gratuitously. I think some limit ought to be put to the number received from this school, as this is the 5<sup>th</sup> promising boy received from this school during the past 9 months and others are to speedily follow.

March 14<sup>th</sup> Attendance very good considering the illness in the town and the absence of the Houseboys.

" 18<sup>th</sup> Examined M<sup>r</sup> Norris bill and M<sup>r</sup> Brown's the builder. I consider M<sup>r</sup> Brown's charges exorbitant, and I fear we must dispense with having new reading books for some time longer.

" 24<sup>th</sup> St Andrew's Church re-opened.

" 25<sup>th</sup> All the boys in the 2 first classes have attended school with well polished boots for the past two days, and the 3<sup>rd</sup> class is following their example.

" 31<sup>st</sup> Rev. J. Woodward, diocesan inspector examined the school. Half holiday in the afternoon.

April 1<sup>st</sup> The custom of making April Fools appears becoming obsolete. There has not been the slightest allusion to the subject in the school that I am aware of.

April 5<sup>th</sup> Mumps rather prevalent, several boys absent on that account.

" 8<sup>th</sup> Received 24 Standard VI Reading Books, Nat. Soc<sup>y's</sup> from Simson.

" 15<sup>th</sup> Good Friday. Boys attended church, no registers marked. Half Holiday in the afternoon. Gave notice of the Easter holidays, to reassemble on 25<sup>th</sup> inst.

" 26<sup>th</sup> 2<sup>nd</sup> class making good progress in writing on paper (unruled).

May 2<sup>nd</sup> Monday. 101 present in morning. Detained C. Borham a houseboy for idleness and disobedience, supplied him with food at 1.30.

" 3<sup>rd</sup> John Fitzjohn admitted, making the third of the same Christian and Surname in school.

" 11<sup>th</sup> Took Prior, Aylott, Fitzjohn and Willmot, four stammerers in Simultaneous reading after morning school.

" 12<sup>th</sup> Hertford horse and cattle fair. Aft<sup>n</sup> attendance small. May 13<sup>th</sup> Friday. Raining all day, attendance good, much better than usual for Friday afternoon.

" 17<sup>th</sup> Allowed the boys a few minutes play in the afternoon to enable them to see H R H The Prince of Wales as he passed the school on his way to Balls Park.

June 15<sup>th</sup> M<sup>rs</sup> Vigus called about her son's truant playing. Explained to her how parents facilitated truancy by keeping their sons at home on every trivial excuse without giving notice to the master.

June 17<sup>th</sup> The Bounds of the Borough beaten this day. Thin attendance in the afternoon.

" 21<sup>st</sup> Congregational Sunday-school treat. Attendance 94 and 84. Thus less difference was made than anticipated.

" 22<sup>nd</sup> The Yeomanry cavalry arrived for 8 days training.

Baptist Sunday school treat in the afternoon. Small attendance in the afternoon.

" 24<sup>th</sup> Quarter day, postponed taking in quarter's bills to enable me to obtain one week's more pence and thus complete the school year. M<sup>rs</sup> Bouchier informed me there was fever and diphtheria where she lodged and therefore her 3 sons had better not attend school till the sickness is over. June 29<sup>th</sup> Yeomanry cavalry review; thin attendance in the aft<sup>n</sup>.

Sent after some suspicious absentees, found they were kept at home.

" 30<sup>th</sup> Charles A Miller completed his apprenticeship this day. 3<sup>rd</sup> class read much better. Last day of school year. Attendance decreased this quarter, owing to sickness (fever and diphtheria). School pence £10.4.5 more than last year. Paid quarter's account due 24<sup>th</sup> inst.

July 4<sup>th</sup> G. Brown commenced his duties yesterday. Received 24 Fourth Consecutive Readers and 36 ditto ditto. M<sup>r</sup> Simpson cannot procure any "Books for Little Readers" and the "Evening at home" are 1/6d each plain and 3/6d illustrated. I have therefore declined having them till I receive further instruction from the treasurer.

" 5<sup>th</sup> Arthur Dymock Baldock, Standard III and Walter Brown went to the Green coat school this day. Thomas Catlin to speedily follow. Cherry fair small attendance.

" 7<sup>th</sup> Bennett has truanted two days, detained him all dinner time, he had his dinner. Flower show in aft<sup>n</sup>.

July 11<sup>th</sup> Admitted a large number of boys from the Infant School. 11 to remain, the others to be sent back when the infant school reopens. Rev. J Lingley visitor brought notice of the Government Inspection on 29<sup>th</sup> inst.

" 13<sup>th</sup> Heard all classes read throughout the school. I have heard the lower classes read much better, more difficult books than they have at present.

" 19<sup>th</sup> Detained 1<sup>st</sup> class to do their dictation lesson again, having been done so badly the 1<sup>st</sup> time.

" 20<sup>th</sup> Small attendance in the afternoon: causes, Baptist and Bengeo Sunday school treats and a cricket match.

" 26<sup>th</sup> G.S. Brown five minutes late in the afternoon. I think it would be beneficial to commence school at 2 pm as many of the parents do not dine till after one pm and some boys have considerable distances to come. At present we assemble at 1.30 and commence at 1.45

" 27<sup>th</sup> A Wilson obtained a certificate of good bodily health

from D<sup>r</sup> Evans. The doctor having given him a certificate when Wilson was apprenticed, thought the second certificate not required. Parents of pupil teachers pay very reluctantly for medical certificates a second time.

" 28<sup>th</sup> Examined upper section in Old Testament history. Sent after absentees.

Eve of Annual Inspection, Daily Average raised from 80 to 94. The master has worked especially at the arithmetic; but for the last 6 weeks with the lower classes in reading. The books have been frequently changed, those at present having been in use about 5 weeks. The 1st two classes have read the books of Joshua and Judges and the gospel of St John, they have also had "Grammar" as their special subject of instruction.

August 1<sup>st</sup> 111 present. Raised all boys a class who were suitable for promotion.

August 4<sup>th</sup> School treat in Balls Park. Broke up for a month's holiday, to reassemble September 5<sup>th</sup>.

Sept 3<sup>rd</sup> received from M<sup>r</sup> Ludlow the Government Report and draft of George Brown's indentures.

September 5<sup>th</sup> Recommenced school. Attendance good. Thomas Catlin admitted to the Green coat school. He was one of the most promising scholars rising Standard III. Nine infants returned to their own school.

Began school at 9 am instead of 9.15 as hitherto. George Brown's indentures signed by himself and his father in my presence.
 W Parker, Esq. paid me his subscription to the school.

20 W Farker, Esq. paid file fils subscription to the school. 21<sup>st</sup> Hearing that the Bouchiers were about leaving for Jersey, sent the school bill to Doctor Cardew. Burleigh played truant all day. This boy has become mixed up with bad associates, and his father is bed-ridden. September 22<sup>nd</sup> First class wrote an essay on "Building a house". The House boys in the class have made good use of their eyes, in notice the progress of house building on the Ware Road.

" 29<sup>th</sup> Agricultural show. Gave notes, and required the 1<sup>st</sup> class to write an essay on the subject, desired them to compare the account in next Saturday's paper.

October 4<sup>th</sup> Received from the Town-clerk an educational form to fill up by December 1<sup>st</sup>.

" 5<sup>th</sup> Very cold and windy. Had fires in school for the first time this season.

" 6<sup>th</sup> Several boys absent picking acorns.

" 27<sup>th</sup> So many caps having been lost recently, gave the boys permission to suspend them behind their backs and for several other good reasons.

Nov<sup>er</sup> 2<sup>nd</sup> Great Educational meeting in the Town Hall this afternoon. Half holiday to make up for the usual one on the 5<sup>th</sup> and to enable the teachers to be present at the meeting.

" 8<sup>th</sup> Horse Fair. Weather fine, is usually wet, hence the local term Wetshod fair. 1<sup>st</sup> Class wrote an account of it. Burleigh played truant all day.

Nov 9<sup>th</sup> Burleigh, who has received vouchers of his attendance for some time past, was flogged as a last resource to prevent his truancies.

His father is bed-ridden and has said I neglected my duty in not caning him hitherto. Rev J Woodward rather unexpectedly examined this school this afternoon.

" 10<sup>th</sup> Two 1<sup>st</sup> class boys spread a false report of there being a half holiday this afternoon as none had been given on account of the diocesan inspection. About 25 absent on that account this afternoon.

" 11<sup>th</sup> Kept in all absentees who believed in the false report of yesterday, as they did not refer to me for the truth. Received 2 tons of coal, 2 sweeping brushes, 1 hand brush, 1 score of faggots for the use of the school.

" 14<sup>th</sup> Cooper and Cannon returned after very long illness. E Allen Re-admitted, he stays as long as the itinerant company performs in the town. Morning attendance 113.

" 16<sup>th</sup> Attendance 109 & 109. Detained Fitzjohn to do his work. Fitzjohn and Oddel are the most troublesome of the houseboys, frequently manifesting a spirit of insubordination. They require very firm treatment.

" 18<sup>th</sup> Best Friday attendance for several years past. 117 + 111 " 24<sup>th</sup> Six certificates, from the Hertford, Local Examination Board in connection with the Society of Arts, awarded to scholars of the school. Ebenezer Hewitt obtained 3 prizes, for General Proficiency, Geography and Scripture.

Dec 1<sup>st</sup> Commenced school at 9.15, having had the chimneys swept this morning: dispensed with play. Rev C.N. Hughes examined the Houseboys.

" 5<sup>th</sup> Finch and Fitzjohn junr two new houseboys admitted, making 21 in all. John Oddel punished for running away at playtime and for general bad behaviour.

Dec 6<sup>th</sup> John Fitzjohn, senior, punished for disobedience and being insolent to the senior PT. This boy and Oddel, Raw and Shadbolt (all houseboys) are exceedingly troublesome.

" 7<sup>th</sup> Practised first class in Bills of Parcels. The conduct of Fitzjohn, Oddel, Shadbolt and Raw improved.

" 12<sup>th</sup> Harvey Frisby played truant in the afternoon.

" 13<sup>th</sup> Harvey Frisby detained till 12.45. Mrs Frisby sent for

her son.

" 14<sup>th</sup> The three Frisbys left.

### 1871

July 20<sup>th</sup> Eve of Examination. During school year ending June 30<sup>th</sup> school open 425 times, 41,219 attendances, 7 more would have made an average of 97. Many older boys have left for work. Houseboys increased in number . There has been a great change in the routine, the spirit of the conscience clause always having been the rule of this school. 89 boys attended 250 times and upwards 7 of whom left ad interim. Grammar was chosen as the special subject of instruction with the hope of improving the older ones in orthography and composition. With the exception of measles the health of the school has been good. 12 boys in the 5<sup>th</sup> class have not been presented for examination as it has not been possible to coach them up to Standard I owing to their backward state of admission.

July 21stMess<sup>rs</sup> Hilton and Baldry examined the school. 102 and100 present. 60 presented + 2 under 7 yrs.

" 24<sup>th</sup> Rev C.J. Robinson made enquires about school gardens: informed that upper gardens should reset to play ground as soon as crops could be cleared off and little or no difficulty anticipated in closing the tenancy with the Miss Greens with the lower garden. Their Lordships will not sanction letting any part of the school estate.

## Government Report 1871

The Reading of the younger children was careless. The hand writing of the three upper Standards requires attention, and in all Standards the Dictation is only moderate. The third and fourth Standards are weak in Arithmetic. Mr Blackwell has worked very fairly and will doubtless remedy these defects.

#### J Lilley

Memorandum. The inspector again this year called attention to the high charges for school stationary, and said if a considerable discount was not allowed, the goods ought to be obtained more cheaply from town. Memorandum. Informed by M<sup>r</sup> Robinson that their Lordships will not sanction the letting of any part of the school estate, see also entry July 24<sup>th</sup> 1871.

## Report 1872

The school is in a very fair state of efficiency. Some of the boys are backward in Dictation and the knowledge of the Special subjects needs to be strengthened.

J Lilley Amount of grant £72.2.0. Deductions nil. Passes in Grammar 12. In Geography 12.

Sept<sup>r</sup> 19<sup>th</sup> Information received that each pupil teacher at this school had gained a 1<sup>st</sup> class certificate at the Diocesan examination in Holy Scripture. Dec 13<sup>th</sup> Completion of Alf Wilson's term of service at this school. On Monday he proceeds to Cheltenham for the Scholarship examination.

Government Report 1873 I should be pleased to see a higher tone & more willing discipline among the boys. The examination is only partially successful. Great weakness is apparent in the handwriting, spelling, & Arithmetic. The Notation however is good, and some of the reading is commendable. The drilling is satisfactory. The discipline and instruction must both improve, cf. (Art 32b) The Report must be entered into the Log Book (Art 39) J Lilley

Sep 15 1873

Inspector's Report on the school 1874

I am glad to find improvement in most respects in this school. The recitation is not quite up to the mark nor are the meaning of attainment sufficiently mastered. The reading of the lower classes is backward.

#### Government Report July 1876

The order is better than the attainment. In the Standard work failure reaches 40 percent. The lower classes are poor in all subjects. Dictation and Arithmetic are at a low mark. Grammar and Geography will be insufficient unless a larger proportion pass creditably. Drill and singing are very fair. For the last six months the assistance has been inadequate. If the second schoolroom which is too remote from the principal Teacher to be under satisfactory supervision is constantly used, at least an Assistant Master will be required, and anyhow a much more powerful staff will be necessary to raise and maintain the efficiency. The School Accounts would be more in form if kept in an official Cash Book (see Circular on Accounts)"

My Lords will look for decidedly better results in Writing and Arithmetic next year. (Article 32(B)

D.G. Thomas has passed an unsatisfactory examination. Should he be required to complete the staff and fail to the same extent next year, the Grant will have to be reduced under Article 32(c) T. Lilley

C.W. Clarke (Grammar (Handwriting Mr C.A. Blackwell, certificated Master Daniel G. Thomas, 4<sup>th</sup> Year pupil teacher C.W. Clarke 1<sup>st</sup> Year pupil teacher.

Oct 19<sup>th</sup> Average for this week 130 nearly. This school has about doubled its average attendance during my charge. I have had no extra assistance. The pence have more than doubled. The grant has risen from about £14 to £82.4.0.

Mr Blackwell took leave of the boys, who with the pupil teachers agreeably surprised him with the present of a very handsome pencil case as a token of their affection and esteem.

## Notes:

- 1. XXX is used on the few occasions that a word could not be deciphered. Text in [] has been included for clarity.
- 2. School logbooks became compulsory in 1862.
- 3. The school was run by a group of managers including the vicar, curate and local business men.
- 4. The school consisted of an infants' school and a junior school which was divided into standards. Standard I for rising 7 year olds, Standard II for rising 8 year olds, etc., up to Standard VII rising 14 year olds. Standards V, Vi and VI had few pupils and were taught with Standard IV. Division 1
- 5. Her Majesty's Inspector visited the school on a number of occasions during the year and on one occasion carried out a formal inspection which included testing the children. The report of that inspection was expected to be copied into the logbook by one of the school managers. These reports and the comments by the inspector on the teaching staff have been typed in italics. How well the children performed in the test had a bearing on how much grant the school was given by the Government.

- 6. A Diocesan inspection was also carried out. This focused on how much religious knowledge the children could demonstrate. Later these reports were also copied into the logbook.
- 7. The school year ran from 1<sup>st</sup> July to 30<sup>th</sup> June but the summer holiday (often referred to as 'harvest holiday') did not usually begin until a few days into August.
- 8. In the school rules the hours of attendance were defined as from 9 to 12 in the morning and 2 to 5 in the afternoon from 1<sup>st</sup> March to 1<sup>st</sup> November and from 2 to 4 during the other five months. (Children usually walked to school and this reduction in hours was to allow the children to reach home before dark.)
- 9. The quarter days were 25<sup>th</sup> March (Lady Day), 24<sup>th</sup> June (Midsummer Day), 29<sup>th</sup> September (Michaelmas), 25<sup>th</sup> December (Christmas Day). These were important days of the year, as this was when rent was due and, in this case, when the teachers and pupil teachers were paid. New registers were begun on quarter days.
- 10.References to 'house boys' means boys who lived at the workhouse which was sited close to where Wheatcroft Primary school is situated at the bottom of Stanstead Road. In the early 20<sup>th</sup> century the workhouse was converted into Kingsmead School and it is now a housing estate.
- 11. The British School (later called Cowbridge School) opened in 1863. It was behind what is now United Reformed Church which at that time was referred to as the Congregational Church.
- 12. The school ran a clothing club into which parents paid small sums of money so that they could redeem the total amount in December and buy clothes for their children.
- 13.Pupils were expected to pay 1d a week to the school for their education. If it was judged by the managers that the parents could afford more the amount would be raised to 2d.
- 14.At this time there was no legal age at which children were to be schooled. The 1880 Education Act was the first act to decree that it was compulsory for children between the ages of 5 and 10, inclusive, to attend school.

Our Hertford and Ware The school moved to a building next to Cowper School on 27<sup>th</sup> January 1868.

- 16.John William Grove was Master of Green Coat School through most of the 1860s.
- 17. The Brown Coat School or School of Industry for Girls was intended to prepare girls for working as servants in large houses, see <u>School of</u> <u>Industry for Girls | Education | Our Hertford and Ware</u>
- 18. Stephen Austin who established a printing firm in 1768 in Fore Street where it was based for many years. It is now situated in Caxton Hill
- 19. The Marquis and Marchioness of Townshend lived at Balls Park.
- 20. The Revised Code of Regulations 1862 which regulated all grants made to schools.
- 21. Ragged Schools were established (the London Ragged School Union in April 1844) to educate the most destitute children. The Hertford one was run by the Hertford town Mission at this time in Bircherley Street.
- 22. An asterisk (') is used with digits or numbers to denote minutes.
- 23. PT stands for Pupil Teacher.
